Ko wai mātou? Who are we?

A common thread runs through the contemporary work of many philosophers, economists, geneticists, historians and novelists world-wide. Who are we? What unites us? What separates us? As we in Aotearoa New Zealand grapple with the consequences of colonisation nearly 200 years on, questions of personal and collective identity resonate on multiple levels. Do we share any form of collective identity?

We invite papers that explore "who are we?" in different and interesting ways.

- There are multiple social and cultural dimensions to identity iwi/hapu, family, ethnicity, occupation, class, sexuality, generation, and gender among them.
- How do we navigate the personal and collective multiplicity of identities that are part and parcel of everyday life?
- In what ways are these identities perceived to overlap?
- How do we negotiate conflicting identities?
- Past or present which matters more when considering who we are?
- Are our life narratives our self-identities?

Through the medium of interviews and life narratives oral historians are able to record a rich diversity of perspectives and make a contribution to understanding the question "Ko wai mātou?" or "Who are we?".

and Julia Whaipooti, Ngāti Porou, in conversation.

Professor Na Li, Department of History, Zhejiang University, China (by Zoom).

Dr Melissa Matutina Williams, independent historian of Te Rarawa and Ngāti Maru descent.

Book Launch

There will be a celebration to launch Nepia Mahuika's book *Rethinking Oral History and Tradition: An Indigenous Perspective* (Oxford University Press Oral History Series, 2019).
