Funding for these grants came from the Australian Sesquicentennial Gift Trust for Awards in Oral History in 1990 to honour 150 years since the signing of Te Tiriti o Waitangi. Each year approximately \$100,000 is divided between the successful applicants (usually a maximum of 12 grants are given). A successful applicant generally receives between \$5000 and \$10,000 towards the costs of their project.

These grants are available for community-led projects reflecting diverse identities and perspectives. Administered by Manatū Taonga Ministry for Culture and Heritage, this funding provides financial help for oral history projects relating to the history of Aotearoa New Zealand and Aotearoa New Zealand's close relationships with the Pacific.

Applications close on 25 October every year.

Intangible Heritage Grants

This is a new Heritage Grant scheme and is available to support communities, groups and individuals (Christchurch and Banks Peninsula)

Intangible Heritage includes knowledge, stories, histories, memories, traditions, waiata, oral histories, trails and past landscape features. It also includes past events, their associated sites and the people connected to them; hidden archaeology, wāhi tapu; wāhi taonga; ingoa wāhi; music; kapa haka; dance and language. Intangible heritage includes the meanings and associations of a place, including historical, social, cultural, spiritual and commemorative values. Intangible Heritage Grants support communities, groups and individuals to practise the principles of Kaitiakitanga and Manaakitanga and to share their own stories and histories.
